- € Centex Real Estate is seeking a preliminary plat approval from the City for a housing development at Rancho Sereno subdivision, units 3, 4, and 5.



Gardening Tips for September:



TRNA President, Ceil van Berkel, presents Janice Chase TRNA's \$100 quarterly award for her outstanding service to our community.

1. Now is the best time to re-seed bluegrass lawns and to plant cool season grasses.
2. Plant chrysanthemums for fall color.
3. Plant pansies and snapdragons for winter and spring color. They usually winter over.
4. Tulips, hyacinths, daffodils and other Spring flowering bulbs should be planted mid-September through January.
5. Best time to fertilize cool-season grasses. If you want to have the greenest lawn on the block next Spring, be sure to fertilize in the Fall.
6. Do not fertilize roses after September 1st.



"Workshops bring kids into the fold as community assets"

Taylor Ranch teens Michael Silecchia and Natalie Solomon helped throw a dance for about 150 neighborhood kids in a nearby park. It was a blast, they said, and no one complained about the music. As Members of the Taylor Ranch Neighborhood Association's youth committee, Michael and Natalie have become involved in a citywide push to make all neighborhoods safe.

At monthly meetings, the committee's 15 members work on projects to "get kids off the street, give them something to do and keep them away from illegal stuff," said Natalie, 14, a Valley High School freshman. "We don't want our neighborhood to become a crime statistic," said Michael, 16. "We want a clean, safe place where kids can grow up happy."

The youth committee sold ice cream and bottled water to raise money for activities, circulated a petition to make sure neighbors didn't object to a dance outside, hired a D.J. and partied to rap and rock until 10 p.m. on a recent Saturday. Their fund-raising also has supported swim parties, girls' softball nights, roller hockey and graffiti cleanups. "Our committee is special in every way," said Michael, a lifelong Taylor Ranch resident who has been active in the youth group since it formed four years ago. He has recruited his younger sister, Courtney, to help. "We're all real close. And we're proving to adults who don't like teen-agers that kids care."

The Taylor Ranch youth committee is the only one of its kind in Albuquerque and is a prime example of how neighborhoods can involve children in community policing and help them become good citizens, said Patricia Torn, Albuquerque neighborhood coordinator for community policing.

Westside traffic protest going forward!

If the village of Los Ranchos' refuses to drop their law suit in response to the most recent city council vote to approve construction of the Montaña bridge, the planned Westside demonstration to divert morning

commuter traffic through the village, called "H.E.R.D.", will go forward. Westside residents are rallying around the idea to take a voluntary detour to work on the mornings of September 12, 13, and 14th. along Rio Grand Blvd.

"The idea is to give the board of trustees of Los Ranchos a taste of the kind of tie-ups they have been subjecting the Westside to for years." Richard Stoneking, a supporter of the Montaña bridge project and a Taylor Ranch resident, has launched a word of mouth campaign throughout the 35 Westside neighborhoods including Corrales and Rio Rancho. The 3 day protest is being fueled by local publicity and the increased support of Westside residents, who; are distributing flyers and passing the word among various neighborhood associations.

"The H.E.R.D. is bringing us together out here. I believe that the H.E.R.D. will demonstrate unity and help vent

the general frustration experienced by those of us who spend 13 days a year in our cars just coming and going to work."


"THE REFRIGERATOR MEMORY SYSTEM" is what Stoneking hopes will keep the drive alive. "Write it down...**Sept. 12,13,&14** on a piece of paper and stick it on your fridge, so you won't forget, then, please participate. Three days of inconvenience will be a drop in the bucket compared 30 years some Westsiders have waited for the

Montaña bridge to be built." People are coming out of the woodwork in support of this protest. I am not surprised at the response. It seems that literally 9 out of 10 people have offered support."

The Horrific Everyday Routine Drive is a daily event in the lives of the Westside commuter, and the saying "Join the H.E.R.D." is becoming a kind of motto for this planned voluntary demonstration. The only action that can stop this H.E.R.D. along Rio Grand Blvd. is for the village trustees of Los Ranchos to drop their lawsuit and cease to create future legal obstacles on the construction of the Montaña bridge." "We are the Westside community, and we are

your neighbors, but enough is enough."


