#### President's Message

We are working on two major issues this month—the first is already in progress but the other is in planning stages and we need your opinions!

#### **Construction on Taylor Ranch Road**

The current Taylor Ranch Road construction between Montano and La Orilla is a part of the Coors Widening Project. That project was presented in a public meeting at Chamiza Elementary School over a year ago. TRNA Board members and other Taylor Ranch residents do not recall this part of the project being mentioned at that time, nor did the City notify TRNA of the current construction before beginning.

Telephone calls from TRNA to Frank Lopez, Project Engineer, resulted in the lighted information sign appearing on the construction site. Three of us then met with Mr. Lopez to learn just what 'median upgrade' meant. The project is to provide bike lanes, two dedicated left turn lanes from southbound Taylor Ranch Road to east-bound Montaño, and a cross-over median in front of the fire department for easier fire truck return access.

TRNA, Mr. Lopez, and a local landscape architect are currently working together to design appropriate replacement landscaping for the new medians.

# Skateboard Park East of Mariposa Basin Park Along Taylor Ranch Road

The City Parks and Recreation Department has proposed building a skateboard park just east of Mariposa Basin Park between the sidewalk and the berm on Taylor Ranch Road.

As the proposed site is part of the gateway to our community, I believe it is an inappropriate place for a skate-board park. There are more appropriate places to build the proposed park, if it should be built at all.

We have recently learned that Bernalillo County has plans in full swing to build a state-of-the-art skateboard park at the Paradise Hills Community Center only four miles from here. If the city proceeds with it's plan to

#### **Neighborhood Notification:** The Trails at Taylor Ranch

Thompson Engineering Consultants, Inc. will be resubmitting the Preliminary Plat for The Trails at Taylor Ranch Subdivision, located north of Montano Road between Whiteman and Pojoaque. This is the same subdivision that was presented to the neighbors in August. The only difference is that the property owners are now the developers instead of Falconridge Development.

The subdivision is proposed to have 41 single family residential lots. The layout includes a full access to Montano Road and a cul-de-sac at Kachina. The property, legally described as Tract C1, Volcano Cliffs Subdivision, Unit 3, is currently zoned R-3.

It is anticipated that the Preliminary Plat will be heard on Wednesday, December 19, 2001 at the Development Review Board.

I would like to wish everybody a safe and happy holiday season. Here are some safety tips to follow while out and about this holiday season.

- Use extra caution while driving, especially in and around the shopping centers. There is a lot more vehicular and pedestrian traffic during this time of the year.
- Place all purchased items or any other valuables you have in your trunk. Having items visible in your vehicle increases the chance of being burglarized.
- While doing your shopping be observant of your surroundings and do not leave shopping bags or purses unattended.
- When walking through parking lots be aware of the people around. We are seeing an increase in con artists
  taking advantage of young women. If an offer sounds too good to be true then it probably is. If you feel that
  you are being followed or see somebody suspicious go back into the store and notify security. Ask for an escort out to your car.

I would also like to remind people not to leave garage doors open while the garage is unattended. We take several reports of burglary where the garage door was left open. 
#### What's Up With Membership?
