Welcome, Principal Jacobson! By Peggy Minich, Director/Education

Jami Jacobson was selected to serve as the principal of Marie M. Hughes Elementary School last November. Except for a few years, this Albuquerque native has lived on the West Side for most of her life. She remembers when Coors was a two-lane road and Taylor Ranch was still a working cattle ranch!

Ms. Jacobson attended Sierra Vista Elementary, Taylor Middle School, Cibola High School, and the University of New Mexico, where she received her undergraduate degree and Masters degree in Elementary Education. She taught at Valle Vista Elementary for seven years. She served as assistant principal at Painted Sky and Petroglyph Elementary Schools for several years and briefly at Chamiza Elementary before moving to Marie Hughes

Elementary. Marie Hughes currently has a staff of 85 serving 723 students.

What's been her biggest challenge? Making the transition to a new school in the middle of a school year and settling in while getting priorities in line. Ms. Jacobson explained that when you're the principal, you "feel the full weight of more responsibility for the outcome" of decisions.

And what have been the rewards? She says that "this is the first time that large groups of children know who I am...and they've been so positive" and, as a result, she can build trust, relationships, and knowledge of her students much more easily. And she says that her staff "are the friendliest group of people. I feel extremely welcome and very included!"

Her goals for Marie Hughes Elementary include strengthening three instructional programs:

- Maintaining and improving site technology (through increased funding and personnel) because technology skills support math and literacy development necessary to daily life;
- School and cluster-wide Balanced Literacy, which aims at reaching students wherever they are as readers (and writers) and moving them to a higher level through a combi-

- nation of methods, modeling, and guiding;
- In the long term, implementing full-time programs for music and art because she firmly believes those skills connect with other ways of learning that help children with math and reading.

When asked how our community can support Marie Hughes Elementary, Ms. Jacobson replied:

- Organize resources to help maintain school grounds;
- Spend time reading with your children, talk with them about school and its value, and make sure they have a time and place to study;
- Vote and actively communicate with your legislators;
- Volunteer to assist in the library or classroom or on the playground;
- Remember to give positive feedback and kudos for what you see and hear that you like; and
- Share your ideas about how the school can best meet the needs and provide for the safety of its children.

Thanks, Ms. Jacobson, for all that you do! ☼
