## Capital Improvement Projects Listed

The list of Capital Improvement Projects submitted by District 5 neighborhood associations (NAs) to Councilor Mike Cadigan is long and will cost much more than the \$1 million available for his district. Cadigan distributed the list at his meeting with District 5 NAs in October.

TRNA had submitted the following projects: Sierra Vista pool cleanup; a sign welcoming people to Taylor Ranch; trails between San Ildefonso and Tesuque, from Tesuque to Petroglyph Park, and in Mariposa Basin; Taylor Ranch Library improvements; and traffic lights that count down the time left to walk on green. We will probably agree to spread the projects over a three-year period and include some funding for the "Unser dogleg."

The next District 5 meeting will be held on November 14. If you would like us to bring up a topic, please feel free to contact me. ☀

## The Long Range Roadway System Map

Road issues are commonly being discussed these days and it would probably be wise for all of us to look at the Long Range Roadway System Map. This Map outlines new roads locations and their traffic carrying duties. It is available from the Middle Rio Grande Council of Governments and on their website [www.mrgcog.org/maps/lrrs20.prt.pdf](http://www.mrgcog.org/maps/lrrs20.prt.pdf).

The Map is altered only through public hearings. In order for a new road on the Map to be built, it must be proposed for inclusion in the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) that is also reviewed in public hearings.

Here is what the Map tells us about roads affecting Taylor Ranch:

- Alignments, through the escarpment, are approved for Unser and Paseo del Norte.
- Unser, Paseo del Norte, Coors, and Montano are the main cross-town traffic carriers through Taylor Ranch and are called Principal Arterials.
- Golf Course and Western Trail are minor arterials.
- Calle Nortena, Taylor Ranch Road, Homestead, Tesuque, Mojave, San Ildefonso, and Dellyne are collectors that should carry neighborhood traffic to the arterials.
- The Boca Negra Road is not formally on the Map, giving it the status of a local or neighborhood street.
- Universe and Kimmick alignments are not on the Map.

# What Can We Do About the Traffic?

## A Community Policing Opportunity, By Virginia Klebesadel

Community Policing is the concept of a community working together to help prevent crime and solve existing problems. The Albuquerque Police Department (APD) conducted a Citywide Community Policing Summit in August to identify, analyze, and develop responses to community crime problems. Traffic Problems ranked an overwhelming first in the Westside Area Command (WC), followed by Police Responsiveness and general crimes of graffiti, vandalism, alcohol, and drugs.

The Westside Area Command conducted a follow-up summit in October to focus on the traffic issue. Virginia Klebesadel from TRNA and representatives from other neighborhood associations within the WC participated in developing answers to the question: "What can citizens do to enhance the City's ability to address Westside traffic issues?"



Three solution categories were identified: Education, Political Systems, and Physical Speed Mitigation.

### EDUCATION

1. Educate Community on safe driving practices and the responsibility of driving lawfully.
2. Educate Community on consequences of unlawful actions through seminars & rallies
3. Educate Community on alternative travel methods such as public transit systems, bicycling or walking when possible.

### POLITICAL SYSTEMS

1. Stop opposition of roads from outside groups.
2. Enforce existing laws better:
  - Establish a court watch program,
  - Remove judges who are weak on law enforcement,
  - Elect judges who are tough on traffic enforcement.
3. Ban use of hand-held cell phones while driving.
4. Create stiffer fines and penalties that actually impact the offender.
5. Report unsafe driving, giving specific details, to 242-COPS.
6. Entreat city council to take community action in enforcing traffic laws.
7. Study and implement big city transit systems.

### SPEED MITIGATION

1. Install speed humps, stop signs, rumble bars.
2. Encourage housing development design with traffic patterns that discourage speeding.
3. Use radar trailers to inform drivers of their current speed.

Ample opportunity exists to address traffic issues. TRNA will be setting up a task force to discuss these items, further educate ourselves, and initiate solutions. ## Zoning Update

**Double Eagle Airport Utilities.** TRNA communicated to the Environmental Planning Commission its support for a project that would extend a water line, a wastewater force main, and a fiber optic duct using the West Mesa Open Space land between Unser and Paseo del Volcan. These utilities allow Double Eagle II airport to continue its development as an employment center and specifically fulfill infrastructure agreements to support Eclipse Aviation's development of its manufacturing facilities at the airport.

The Open Space Division will oversee the post-construction restoration of the Open Space. The area to be restored includes a trench made through the escarpment in the gas pipeline easement (also the approved Unser alignment corridor which is south of Boca Negra canyon) for the wastewater line to come down off the mesa and connect to the wastewater main in Montano road. On the upper mesa, the restoration will include the construction of a trail in the disturbed corridor, which will give outdoor recreationists a trail from the top of Boca Negra Canyon extending to the volcanoes.

Both the EPC and the Open Space Advisory Committee voted to approve this utility.

**Cross of Hope Expansion.** TRNA communicated its support for expansion of the buildings of the Cross of Hope Church at the northeast corner of Montano and Taylor Ranch Road. ☀

Heather Wilson and Richard Romero, candidates for US House District 1, and Jim Southard and Eric Youngberg, candidates for State House District 23, participated in an informative and well-organized forum. Each candidate gave opening remarks and then responded to questions from our moderator, Richie Spangler. (Audience members submitted their written questions to the moderator.)

The weather and World Series likely kept attendance low; however, we successfully conducted a brief general meeting between the staggered candidate appearances.

*Editor's note:* One might think that seeing a candidate speak isn't important and people don't matter in the big political machine. But when we write a letter or go to a forum, we let the candidates see *us*. Our presence lets them know that we do matter, that we do care, and that they are responsible to represent *us*. ## Westside Equestrian Center Update

The landowners of the former Westside Equestrian Center have appealed the City Council decision upholding the equestrian-use zoning to the Second Judicial District Court. The City of Albuquerque, in October, petitioned that the case be removed to the United States District Court.

TRNA is forming an Advisory Committee to assist in finding a buyer or lessee for the property, in the event the equestrian-use zoning. We are looking for members of the equestrian community who have some experience with this kind of business. In addition, we would like to form a larger Friends of the Equestrian Center group to help preserve the equestrian use and build support for the new center. At this stage, we are making preliminary contacts and gathering data to determine a fair market value for the land. ☀



## Universe Update

### Traffic Mitigation

Councilor Cadigan set up a meeting for TRNA and Santa Fe Village Neighborhood Association to meet with Mayor Chavez regarding mitigation measures for the additional traffic that will be in our neighborhoods once Universe Boulevard opens.

Both neighborhood associations presented specific ideas to the administration regarding how to 'calm the traffic,' that is, how to keep it going the speed limit, improve safety, and discourage Rio Rancho commuters from using this corridor. The Mayor asked his staff to work with the neighborhoods and address their concerns as much as possible. We have also had follow-up meetings and conversations with the Public Works Director.

Here are some highlights of what we know is happening so far:

- Signage has been installed on Universe to indicate speeds and curves.
- Signage will be installed on the Boca Negra Road to warn of the steep hill and speed limits.
- The shoulders of the Boca Negra Road will be reinforced with asphalt.
- Striping patterns are being considered to warn motorists to slow down as they pass through the neighborhoods, roughly the area from the National Park entrance to Montano.
- A radar trailer, which will flash to the oncoming motorist his traveling speed, is being considered for installation at the bottom of the hill.

- Traffic counts should be taken before and after the road is open for the following streets to record the changes in traffic (Mojave, Santo Domingo, Tesuque, Dellyne, Unser, and Montano). Based on the results, additional measure may be taken to reduce cut-through traffic problems on neighborhood streets.
- Signal timing is being reviewed at the intersections of Unser/Montano and Unser/Dellyne in order to make sure that new traffic levels are accommodated.

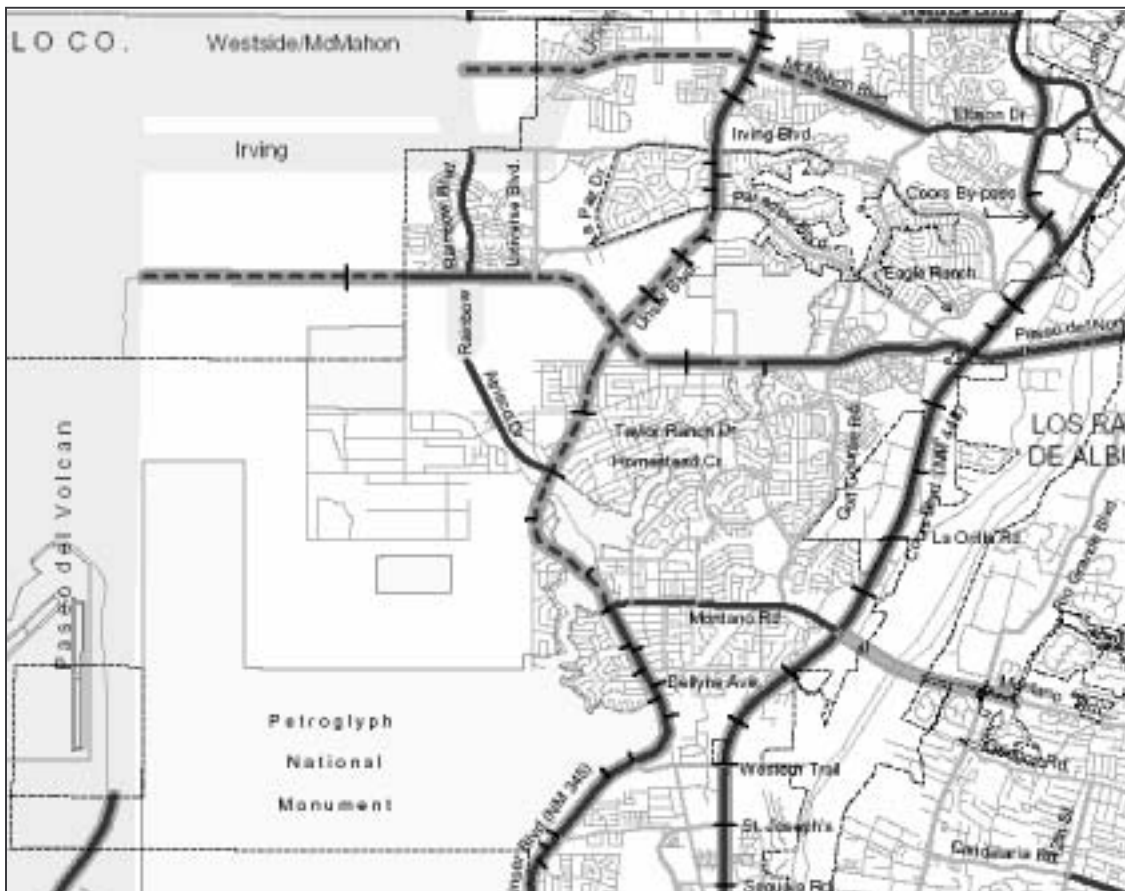
### Moving Traffic out of the Boca Negra Canyon

The Mayor and Councilor Cadigan are both working diligently to line up funding and right of way for the "Unser dogleg" to be built. The dogleg is the road segment extending from the intersection of Montano and Unser, through the escarpment at the gas pipeline scar, connecting to Universe.

Once this road segment is complete, the Boca Negra road from the top of the mesa to the National Park entrance will not be open to cars, only to bikers/hikers. The road from the National Park entrance to Montano will return to its function as a local neighborhood street. Because of the myriad issues related to this construction, the Mayor cannot offer specific dates at this time. TRNA will be doing all it can to facilitate this process.

### A Temporary Unser

The Public Works Director has announced in two public meetings that he intends to build a temporary road, the Kimmick alignment, which would connect the top of Boca Negra Canyon to Paradise Road. Mr. Asbury stated that the City has this right-of-way for Kimmick, whereas the Unser right-of-way is still being acquired.



No neighborhood associations have taken formal positions on this yet, but much concern is being expressed about the implications of such a road. TRNA has already requested that before any future temporary roads are built that they go through a public notification process.

Councilor Cadigan is introducing legislation in early November to amend the Neighborhood Ordinance to require notification to neighborhood associations regarding future temporary roads. The TRNA board will likely discuss the Kimmick alignment at its November meeting. ☀

### Sex Offender Seen Loitering in TR

“The Bernalillo County Sheriff’s Department and Albuquerque police has placed an around-the-clock watch on a sex offender who has decided to make the area his new home. Michigan ex-con David Siebers moved to Albuquerque recently after a chilly reception in several other states. He has a particularly violent and troubling past and presents a unique problem for area law enforcement. “ says the October 30 Albuquerque Journal article by Jeff Jones.

Siebers has been observed loitering near Taylor Ranch Shoppes. He is a 45-year-old Anglo-American male, 5 ft. 11 in. tall, 185 lbs., brown hair with significantly receding hairline, blue eyes. The most recent photo shows him clean-shaven and wearing large light-colored glasses. An old photo on the Sex Offender website, [www.nmsexoffender.com](http://www.nmsexoffender.com), shows a moustache and black-framed glasses. Detectives from the APD Crimes Against Children Unit told Taylor Ranch community members that the 24/7 watch will end on 10/31.

Residents need to be particularly watchful—past offenses have involved adult women; however, authorities suspect that his attentions have recently been directed toward pre-teen females. The Albuquerque Journal article gives more information about Siebers. ☼

**APD Westside Area Command**

The Westside Area Command recently held a Neighborhood Meeting with several leaders of Westside Neighborhood Associations to discuss priority concerns of the residents living on the Westside.

The Westside leadership brainstormed for ideas to deal with the #1 complaint: Traffic. While there are several factors contributing to the traffic problem, many are beyond the average citizens' immediate control. However, several things might start us in the right direction:

- Be very conscientious about one's own driving. Be aware of speed limits, stop signs, and traffic control devices, red lights, etc.
- If you have any influence over drivers in your household, talk to them and encourage safe driving.
- Avoid falling into bad driving habits of others. "Everyone else drives poorly; I'm just doing what they're doing."

- Don't let someone else's bad day (road rage) give you one. Ignore or avoid others' aggressive driving behavior.

These are just a few things we can do to make our community safer. While we have no control over others' driving habits, we do have control over our own.

To be continued...in the meantime, please drive safely and let's continue working together for long-term solutions.
