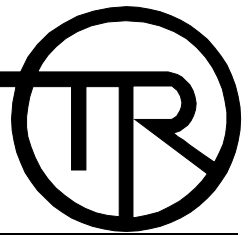

West Side Coalition of Neighborhood Associations Report—June 3, 2009

Lieutenant Ed Ade (APD) reported burglary statistics for the west side. There were 94 auto burglaries in January, 74 in February, 112 in March, 124 in April, and dropped to 53 in May. There were at least 64 auto burglaries last year in May. Most auto burglaries occur at the mall and near the theater. He suggested not parking in the upper lot near the Theater at Cottonwood Mall.

Residential burglaries also dropped in May. There were 5 in January, 55 in February, 62 in March, 61 in April, and 45 in May. There were 70 in May last year. Most residential burglaries are in the I-40 area.

A couple of repeat offenders were arrested recently for 10 burglaries, but are likely responsible for a lot more. Most residential burglaries are done by kicking in front or back doors, or punching locks. It might be a good idea to reinforce the door frames on your house and use more than one lock, of different kinds, on each door.

City Councilor Ken Sanchez reported that the Unser Crossing project is breaking ground Thursday (by the time you read this report, it would have already occurred). The city budget was passed and a court battle was avoided. The mayor offered an amendment. Ladera Golf Course in getting new irrigation. A library at Unser and Central will be built. Six Volcano Vista students were at the recent City Council meeting and were expressing concerns about safety and traffic on Universe. In my opinion, completion of Unser into Rio Rancho would improve this issue. KB Homes donated land for a memorial park for the Westside victims. The company will build the park, and the city will maintain it.

Councilor Michael Cadigan reported that there is substantial funding in the new budget for neighborhoods and parks. Construction of Seville Park will begin by the end of summer. Other parks funded are Ventana Ranch, Rancho Encantada, and Chantilly. There is debate over changing the way restaurants are graded. A restaurant now gets either a red or green rating. There is a proposal to change that to A, B, C, D, or F ratings. Cadigan will likely vote against the change, citing cost, pressure put on city leaders by restaurant owners if rated low, and increased chance for corruption. There is a District 5 community meeting at DNTRCC on June 25. Cadigan attended a meeting with Governor Richardson, and the governor is hearing about how the stimulus money is being allotted and is concerned, so there is still hope for getting the Paseo del Norte/I-25 intersection rebuilt.

Jason Marks (PRC) reports that PNM rates are increasing on July 1, by 5.1 percent. It will increase again in April 4.6 percent. For more information email wscn@trna.org ®

Land Use Update

1. The First Baptist Church West Albuquerque located at La Orilla and Golf Course / phase II expansion:

In June, the Church, submitted plans to DRB, to add a new 17,434 sq. ft., worship area to their existing facility. Last Spring, the Church had proposed to build 4-tent like buildings known as sprung structures to expand their facility. They abandoned that idea when the community said no to sprung structures at a facilitated meeting. It turns out that the original site development plan for the Church was approved by the EPC on April 20th, 1995. It showed three phases of development for the Church. The existing Church was the first phase; the new worship area will be the second phase. Conditions were placed on the 1995 site plan, which include a 10 foot landscape buffer around the entire site, additional landscaping for future buildings and parking lot, and reseeding open areas with natural grass seed.

The City's Development Review Board (DRB) held a public hearing on July 8th and July 22nd to hear this case. Four members from Alban Hills, and Taylor Ranch Neighborhood Associations attended the hearings and provided comments. Alban Hills and TRNA both agreed that the proposed stucco framed building is much better than the proposed sprung structures and is an improvement over the existing metal building. At the

same time the neighborhood representatives wanted to make sure the two buildings were color coordinated, and that the signage on the new building be toned down, with no more LED signs (the Church has one existing LED sign on the corner). The neighborhood representatives also wanted the second phase to follow the 1995 site plan conditions especially in regards to landscaping. Alban Hills wanted to improve the view of the Church on the north side since it will have a blank wall facing them, by beefing up the landscape buffer on the north end. In regards to traffic, the neighborhoods wanted the DRB to be aware that traffic congestion at the intersection of Coors and La Orilla has been increasing over the years especially on Sunday mornings due to new Churches being built along La Orilla road, and that future expansion of existing Churches will add to the traffic congestion.

The DRB approved the project on July 22nd after changes were made to the plan. The changes included constructing the 10 foot landscape buffer around the entire site as agreed to in the 1995 site plan. In addition, the DRB requested that a bus shelter be constructed on Golf Course road, and that a bicycle path be constructed on the north side of the Church adjacent to the buffer. This is part of the City's planned trail system which will ultimately lead to the river.

2. ABCWUA (Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority)/ Waste Water Treatment Center at Bosque School:

Last May, the ABCWUA held a facilitated meeting to explain their intent to purchase four acres from Bosque Prep School to build a waste water treatment facility south of Montañó and east of Coors, between the Open Space parking lot and Bosque School. This property requires a zone amendment to allow the facility. The facility will be designed to handle up to 15 million gallons of effluent per day. The purpose of the facility is to reuse treated waste water on large turf areas such as the Ladera golf course and Mariposa Park, thereby helping to conserve river water for drinking use, rather than irrigation use. The rest of the treated water will go into the river following EPA standards. Public funding will be used to design the buildings and landscape the site. John Stomp, the head of ABCWUA, said there would be several buildings on the site. He thought the tallest building would only need to be 30 ft. high, in order to contain a crane needed for the facility. The architecture would be similar to the Bosque campus, and that the buildings would contain the odor and noise. Much of it would be underground. It will take 10 to 20 years to complete.

To help the community groups understand the scope and purpose of the proposed facility at Coors and Montañó,

TRNA asked John Stomp to tour similar facilities in the area. On June 9th, residents from TRNA, La Luz and La Luz del Sol toured the Cabezon waste water facility in Rio Rancho with John Stomp. The Cabezon facility was built with private funds. It sits on a two acre site protected by a chain link fence. It was designed to handle up to 600,000 gallons of effluent per day using bacteria to breakdown the waste and eat up odors. The site contains several metal buildings, with an industrial appearance, which house the equipment and control odor. Air pumps located on the ground outside the buildings were very loud.

After touring the Rio Rancho facility, John Stomp took the group to Albuquerque's water treatment facility at the Renaissance Center near I-25. Albuquerque's Renaissance facility sits on 160 acres. Its function is to treat the Rio Grande / San Juan River water for use as Albuquerque's drinking water. Residents are currently drinking 25% river water. This will increase to 50 – 100% in the future. The purpose of the river water treatment facility is to protect the aquifer from further depletion. The tour demonstrated that Albuquerque's water treatment facility built with public funds allowed for a more robust, higher quality design than the Rio Rancho facility. The Renaissance Center had stucco buildings designed by the Architect Van Gilbert. The building's walls were designed thick enough to contain the noise of the equipment contained inside. Odor was not an issue at this facility since this facility does not deal with waste water.

On June 18th, the EPC reviewed the zone amendment request to build a public utility facility. While there was no neighborhood opposition to the project, there were a few concerns. Since this project would take twenty years to complete, TRNA wanted a few conditions placed on to the project to insure that there would not be any impacts to the area with noise or smell and that it would have an architecturally pleasing design, and blend with the natural environment of the Bosque. Building heights should also be limited to 30 ft. La Luz expressed concerns that the zone change could lower property values for nearby residents and a future shopping center. If the project was approved, La Luz thought the project should try to be of benefit in providing water for residential irrigation such as the La Luz complex.

The EPC approved the zone amendment. The EPC did place a few conditions on the approval but since there was no site specific information available it was difficult to place very specific conditions. The City planner did include in her conditions that only certain styles of architectural would be allowed in order to avoid an industrial boxy appearance, and also the 100 ft buffer will

be maintained. The planner did say that the site plan for building permit will have to go through EPC again which will allow for more public involvement.

3. Coors Corridor Plan Update: The draft will be out in September and be heard by the EPC in October. View regulations and LED signs are the most controversial issues at this point. LED signs are the bright flashy signs that have recently been introduced along our roadways in the last few years.

4. Air Quality Division July 22nd hearing/ fugitive dust: Because of the blowing dust problem on the Westside, several residents were interested in attending the Air Quality Division public hearing for the property at the corner of Montañó and Coors which had received a fugitive dust violation. Once a property owner receives notice of violation they can either pay a fine or have a hearing. The property owner at first wanted a hearing, but later decided to settle by paying the fine. The fine turned out to be \$8,500. In addition to the fine, the property owner will have to continue adding more soil stabilizer and to fix and maintain the silt fence. 311 is the number to call to report blowing dust problems. There have been numerous complaints about the blowing dust at this site. Unfortunately, the land was prematurely graded before they were ready to build and Westside residents and businesses have had to suffer the consequences for the last three years.

5. TRNA flea market/ Land Use table: Our Land Use table sold \$130 worth of items at the TRNA flea market. All proceeds at our table will be used to reimburse TRNA for the Wal-Mart appeal. I would like to recognize several people who made our table a success; Anni de Steiguer, Bernice Dalby, and Kathleen Ingley!

6. Impact Fee Waiver, City Council meeting August 3rd: By the time you get this newsletter the City Council will have already reviewed whether to waive Impact Fees on new construction for one year. They are looking at revising the Impact fee ordinance to waive 100% of the impact fees for one year for sustainable residential and commercial construction permits, and waive 50% for all other residential and commercial developments. The intent of this legislation is to stimulate new construction, particularly on the Westside. The area that is most likely to see an increase in residential construction is the Southwest mesa. Many residents already feel this area is overbuilt with housing developments and are concerned that taxpayers would be asked to shoulder the capital improvement burden of new development to cover the cost of the lost revenue. The City is obligated to pay for capital improvement projects which the Impact Fees help pay for. Impact Fees are already designed to be used in

the areas from which they are collected. Councilor Cadigan has always been a strong advocate for the Impact Fee program. Unfortunately, the County has recently waived Impact Fees for new construction. René Horvath 898-2114. ☎
