Holiday Crime Prevention Tips

Tips While Shopping

Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you.

Shop with a friend. There is safety in numbers.

Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.

Pay for purchases with a check, credit or debit card.

If possible, carry only your driver's license, personal checks, or necessary credit or debit cards.

If you must carry a purse, do not wrap the straps around your arms or shoulders. Carry a clutch purse tightly under your arm or wear a fanny pack.

Do not carry a wallet in a back pocket. It should be placed in a front pocket of your pants for safety.

Be alert that crooks look for the "high dollar" shopping bags with your purchases. When possible, slip bags/purchases in a plain nondescript bag.

Watch purchases while eating in mall food courts; bags can easily be switched or taken.

Education your children about what to do if they are lost as well as "stranger danger."

Don't overburden yourself with too many packages. Use store's package pick-up.

If you do return to your vehicle to unload purchases, place them in the truck of the vehicle well out of sight.

Tips in Parking Lots

Shop early and leave early to avoid evening darkness.

Park in a high visibility area and check for lighting in case you leave during hours of darkness.

Prior to arriving at the shopping center, lock all your valuables in the trunk of your vehicle.

Leave the store with others, not alone.

Ask security to escort you to your vehicle if you feel uncomfortable..

Walk briskly, confidently, and directly through the parking lot. Be cautious of people handing out fliers or asking questions in the parking area.

Watch for people who may be following you. This can happen inside as well as outside. If you suspect someone following you, report it to APD at 242-COPS.

Land Use Update

1. Coors Corridor Plan 2014 draft/ 3 Facilitated meetings:

At the October 2nd EPC hearing, the Environmental Planning Commissioners (EPC) said the draft lacked clarity, flexibility, and vision, and came close to denying it, but at the last minute decided to continue working on it for another 90 days. They requested that the Planner meet with stakeholders to address their concerns. Three facilitated meetings were scheduled: November 12th, & 19th, and December 2nd. The two November meetings focused on Transportation. The December 2nd meeting will focus on view preservation and development design issues. Below is a description of how the first two meetings went.

Summary of the November 12th facilitated meeting - transportation issues between Central and St. Josephs.

The neighborhoods between Central and I-40, sent a letter that was read at the meeting, stating that they did not support the 2014 draft for the following reasons: homes and businesses would be razed to accommodate the ROW needed for transit lanes, this would have a negative impact on the area's property values, it would negate years worth of work by community leaders to bring businesses and amenities to the community, it would destroy the landscaped medians they worked hard to get, noise levels would be unbearable, and it would disrupts the character and function of their community.

A representative from the TV station KNAT said that many places along Coors have less than the needed 160 feet of Right of Way (ROW) required to expand the roadway, and would encroach on their building. The TV station has a unique facility because it holds a federal license to operate and broadcast from that specific location, any change would have to go through the FCC.

The Neighborhoods north of I-40 expressed opposition to extending the elevated road from I-40 to St. Josephs. The elevated road would bypass businesses adjacent to Coors, overlook the adjacent homes and subdivisions next to the road, limit their access to their neighborhoods, and add more noise to the area. How much ROW will be needed? How will it affect the businesses? Will an economic analysis been done to examine the affects an elevated roadway would have on the adjacent businesses?

Chris Baca the Traffic Engineer acknowledged that the older sections of Coors were built before the 1984 Coors Corridor Plan existed. Those areas do not have the 160 ft. of ROW needed for the expansion.

Summary of the November 19th meeting - transportation issues between Western Trails and Paseo del Norte.

The Planner and Traffic Engineer explained the need for a BRT system with separate transit lanes and elevated lanes to get traffic moving along Coors Blvd. Again the ROW issue came up. There does not appear that certain locations along Coors have enough room to add another lane for transit and bicycles. How will ROW be acquired? How will the expansion affect Andalucía's attractive landscape buffer or the subdivisions that were built too close to Coors? There were concerns expressed for bicycle safety on the bike lanes, especially if placed between vehicle lanes and bus lane. There was discussion on the 3 proposed connector roads to parallel Coors: (1) Connect Winterhaven to La Orilla, (2) Connect Costa Maresme (behind Jinja's restaurant) to the La Luz del Sol community to Dellyne, (3) Eliminate the signalized intersection south of Paseo that currently serves SIPI and connect SIPI to Eagle Ranch road along the drainage canal. The reason for eliminating the SIPI intersection is that there will be major changes made to Paseo del Norte with a flyover ramp heading south. The reason given for building the other connector roads is to establish a grid network to reduce traffic congestion along Coors. The residents from Winterhaven say they already receive enough traffic along Winterhaven and do not support Winterhaven being used as a cut through road to relieve Coors Blvd. traffic.

The following comments were also mentioned at the meeting: (1) Have the transit lanes also be a HOV (High Occupancy Vehicle) lane, so vehicles with more than one rider can use the transit lanes as well as buses. (2) Brainstorm "bold ideas" for solving traffic problems. For instance, "congestion pricing," to charge motorists for using the roadway during peak travel times, which hopefully would encourage motorists to change their commute times to avoid the fee. This has been successful in other places. (3) We need funding to acquire land along Coors Blvd to build Park and Rides before the opportunity is lost to purchase the land. Coors/Montano and St. Josephs/Coors should be considered as possible locations. (4) Revamp the subdivision ordinance to encourage subdivisions to have multiple connections to one another, as they were laid out in the past, instead of surrounding each new subdivision with a wall. This would make it easier for pedestrians and bicyclists to reach their destinations without being blocked.

While we don't want to ignore the transportation problem, we also don't want to sacrifice the quality of life in our existing neighborhoods in order to allow unconstrained growth further west. More discussion is needed to help figure the best course of action in solving our transportation problems.

The **Next facilitated meeting** will be held **Tuesday, December 2nd at the Taylor Ranch Community Center at 6:00 -8:30 pm.** The focus is on view preservation and development design between Namaste and Alameda.

2. Santolina Development/ upcoming County Planning Commission (CPC) hearing/ Wednesday December 3rd/ City Council Chambers/ 9:00 am: This will be the 6th hearing on Santolina. The County Planning Commission said that the Santolina Master Plan must meet the County's "Planned Community Criteria," which states: "A planned Community Master Plan shall not be approved if it fails to demonstrate its own sense of place, self sufficiency, environmental sensitivity, separation from the contiguous Albuquerque urban area by permanent open space and provision of infrastructure which is not a net expense to the City." Public comments should focus on whether the Santolina plan meets this criteria.

So far it appears that the Santolina does not meet the self-sufficiency test: It will still be relying on Albuquerque for water, jobs for the new residents, a roadway network to get into town, such as I-40, and public funding to help build the development, even though Santolina says there will be no net expense to the County.

3. The La Orilla/Coors Blvd. Site/ Final County Administrative hearing/ November 12th:

The second and final hearing for this case was held November 12th before the Zoning Administrator. The developer had requested an amendment to the 2009 special use permit/site plan to place a 37,500 sq ft building on the west side of property, plus have five other smaller buildings, 3 of which would be fast food restaurants, and change the 26 single family lots to a 66 unit apartment complex. TRNA was concerned about the increase in drive through restaurants and Alban Hills was concerned about traffic issues with the proposed apartments. These concerns were expressed at the October 14th Administrative hearing, along with several other issues. The Zoning Administrator decided to continue the hearing to November.

The developer made changes to his first proposal following the October 14th hearing. He decided to keep the residential homes instead of building apartments and he removed one of the drive through restaurants. The developer also said he would not keep the shopping center open 24 hours. As a result of all the positive revisions, TRNA, Alban Hills, and Rio Oeste HOA testified in support of the proposed amendment at the November hearing. The Zoning Administrator approved the applicant's request. The approval also placed conditions

on the Wendy's architecture to blend with shopping center and to keep the site plan signage. This effort took several months of discussion with the developer and we are very pleased with the results.

4. Andalucia/ EPC hearing December 11th: TRNA recently received a site plan for Andalucia - phase #4. The proposed subdivision is located in the vacant lot on the east side of Coors Blvd at Coors and Seville. They are asking for an exception to the view regulations for 17 lots due to site constraints. We met with the developer, Pulte Homes, on November 20th. The entire subdivision will be restricted to single story homes and be ungated. There is still concern about preserving the views along this portion of Coors. The EPC is scheduled to hear the request on December 11th.

I want to thank everyone for their hard work in keeping up with the land use issues. It was an extremely busy year. I appreciate all the time and energy many of you put into keeping the Taylor Ranch Community a nice place to live. Have a Happy Holiday! — Rene Horvath

Applicants for the Taylor Ranch Neighborhood Association's \$750 Scholarship must meet all four of the following criteria:

- 1) **Reside within boundaries** of the Association: north/south boundaries: Paseo del Norte and Western Trail; east/west boundaries: Rio Grande (river) and West Mesa Petroglyph Escarpment – those residing outside of boundaries will be rejected.
- 2) **Submit** this completed **Scholarship Application form and two (2) letters of recommendation**, postmarked no later than March 1, 2015, to the address at the bottom of this form. Letters must be dated and signed and sent directly to TRNA.
- 3) **Demonstrate community involvement and service** through school-wide and extracurricular activities, and/or other organizations. Note – Scoring of this portion is important. Details, dates, and writing a good narrative matters.
- 4) **Enroll** at a college, university, or post-secondary school, including certificate programs or trade programs, for Fall 2014.

Scholarship awards will be presented to the school business office or bookstore of the selected students' choice.
