

School Is Out for the Summer!

The last day of school was Friday, the 22nd of May ... Hurrah! The kids are excited and anxious to get out and play instead of having homework to do! Or maybe you are looking forward to a great family vacation out of town?

Please remember with school out it means more children outdoors in Taylor Ranch, so be careful when driving our streets. Be aware of what's behind you when you back out of your driveway. Stay alert for balls and hence kids running out in front of you. Keep our kids safe this summer!

Here's a few more tips from the APS Health & Nutrition Department for dealing with outdoor exposure:

"As summer approaches and the temperature rises, we all need to remember a few basics for the kids as they head outside to play. Skin cancer is the most common cancer. Most skin cancer occurs due to sunburns before the age of 18, so it is important to prevent your child from getting sunburned by applying sunscreen frequently. SPF stands for *Sun Protection Factor*. That number tells you how long you can stay in the sun without getting sunburned. If the sunscreen's SPF is 15, then that means you can stay in the sun 15 times longer before you risk getting sunburned. Even water proof sunscreen needs to be reapplied every 4-6 hours. Sunburns that damage skin cells today may mature into cancer cells later in life. Your child may complain now, but they will thank you later!

Dehydration is always a concern here in New Mexico. Replacing water lost through sweat is important particularly during the summer months. Have your children drink WATER. Cokes and sugary juices may actually help to dehydrate your child. Bring the kids in for a cool glass of water at least every 45 minutes while outdoors. Watch for nausea and headaches; these are signs of dehydration.

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Land Use Report

1. Santolina Appeal Hearings to be continued to May 28th 1:30 pm/ City Council Chambers. (*Ed note – “Santolina” is a master planned community for the Rio Puerco area west of town that, if fully populated according to the plan, would be larger than Santa Fe. Think “Mesa del Sol,” and look what happened to it.)*)

On May 11th the Bernalillo County Commission (BCC) continued their review of the Santolina Master Plan and the five appeals that were submitted. The appeal hearings began on March 25th and 26th, and were continued to May 11th. Four of the Appeals were filed in opposition to the County Planning Commission (CPC) decision to approve Santolina. The fifth appeal was filed by Western Albuquerque Land Holdings (WALH), because they felt the findings and conditions in the CPC's approval are too restrictive and unnecessary.

WALH's appeal came up first. WALH requested a postponement, so they could be heard at a later date. WALH's attorney told the BCC that they had just submitted a Development Agreement at 1:30 pm that afternoon to the County. They wanted the County Commissioners to have time to review the Development Agreement before they presented their Appeal case. The BCC granted their request for a postponement. Their case will be heard May 28th.

The County Commissioners then listened to the Southwest Organizing Project's (SWOP) appeal. SWOP had filed two appeals in opposition to the development but only one was presented on May 11th. The President of SWOP, and their attorney Douglas Meiklejohn, asked that the County Commissioners reject the approval of the Santolina Master Plan for the following five reasons:

- Santolina Master Plan does not comply with the “**Planned Community Criteria**” or provide documentation of physical and legal **water availability**.
- There is not an **adequate transportation plan** for the proposed development.
- There is no indication that the development will support **schools that are needed** for the development.
- Santolina has not adequately taken into account the impacts the proposed development would have on the **sand dunes** located in the Santolina area.

The economics of the proposed development indicates it cannot be constructed **at no net expense to the government, which is a requirement of the Planned Community Criteria.**

SWOP also brought up that the Development Agreement between the Applicant and the County was a very critical document in terms of the financial obligations between the two parties. They requested an opportunity to see the Development Agreement before the next hearing. At the end of the hearing the Commissioners voted 3-2 to deny the appeal. There was no discussion to explain the reason for their vote. The Commissioners also took a 3-2 vote that no public testimony would be taken on the Development Agreement when it comes up at the May 28th hearing. County Commissioners Maggie Hart Stebbins and Debbie O'Malley were the two votes in both cases that did **not** support the motion to deny the appeal, nor to prohibit public testimony on the Development Agreement.

The remaining four Appeals are scheduled to be heard on Thursday, **May 28th at 1:30 pm in the City Council Chambers.** TRNA submitted a letter last fall stating that it did not support the approval of the proposed 13,700 acre Santolina Master Plan, because our resources such as water, infrastructure and funding are inadequate to support 90,000 new residents.

2. Open Space \$11 million Trust fund/ Open Space priority List. City Council has been reviewing two issues pertaining to Open Space.

(a) There are many Lands listed in the Open Space priority list that still need funding in order to be acquired. La Cuentista is also on the priority list.

(b) City Council has been considering whether to dissolve the Open Space Trust Fund to purchase these lands.

Open space needs around \$30 million to purchase all of the lands on the list. There is only \$11 million currently available in the Open Space Trust fund, which is not enough to buy all the land. City Council has been discussing whether to dissolve the Fund in order to initiate the purchase of these lands. The reasons for dissolving the Trust fund is that it is only generating a small amount of interest and land values are going up, making it more expensive to purchase Open Space land in the future.

On May 5th, a study session was held to discuss the situation. Five City Councilors (Councilor Sanchez, Garduno, Harris, Gibson and Trudy Jones) attended the session along with several City Directors from various departments. The public got to sit in the audience to listen to the discussion. It was a very good discussion between the Councilors and City Staff. (Cont'd on next page)

(Open Space Trust Fund cont'd) We learned that the Trust Fund was created in 1982 with the purchase of the Elena Gallegos Open Space. The Trust Fund was set up to generate interest that would be used to pay for the maintenance & improvements made to open space. If the interest accumulated above a certain amount, then the money could be used to purchase more open space land.

In previous years, the Trust Fund generated up to \$2 Million in income due to high interest rates. This year the Fund only generated \$45,000. One of the reasons for the low interest is that the City has not been investing the Trust Fund efficiently to generate a higher return. The City also obtained exchange lands with the purchase of Elena Gallegos. These lands were intended to be sold off to generate more revenue for open space. Some of the lands are in Farmington, Las Cruces, and Moriarty areas.

Alan Reed, a former City Councilor, and a retired UNM Professor, attended the study session. He told me he was involved in setting up the Trust fund back in the 1980's. He said the fund was intended to be used for the maintenance of the Open Space land, and could generate a better return by focusing on better ways to invest the money. The exchange lands also need to be sold and the money put back into the Trust Fund so it could generate more income.

Mr. Reed came to our last TRNA Board meeting to explain the history and intent of the Trust Fund, which clarified the details. The Board then took a position to recommend Council to **not** dissolve the fund but to get the Fund working again as Mr. Reed suggested. City Council **Finance Committee will be reviewing the future of the Trust Fund on June 8th.**

3. Paseo Del Norte noise problem update: As I reported in last month's issue, a member of TRNA reported that a loud noise was coming from the Paseo del Norte roadway near the escarpment. The noise hadn't been heard prior to December 2014. Luckily, with a few phone calls, we were able to contact a Transportation Engineer from NMDOT, Will Dodge, who was able to pinpoint the source of the noise after conducting an inspection. He said that a portion of the roadway had settled and he was going to submit a funding request to perform repairs. Mr. Dodge hopes to get them done this summer.

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News & Notes

Construction of I-40 at Coors is scheduled to begin June 1st. The New Mexico Dept of Transportation will begin pavement work on I-40 from the west end of the Rio Grande bridge to just west of the Coors Interchange. Info and project updates will be posted at CoorsI40.NMRoads.com.

Country Meadows Dog Park to open in June. This new dog park is at the northwest corner of Universe and Ventana Village Road, and will feature natural vegetation and an agility training course.

Tennis Complex at Ventana Ranch Park opens in June. Courts are striped for tennis or pickleball, and will be lit for night play.

Irving is Open! Councilor Dan Lewis celebrated with others at a ribbon cutting 1st of May. The long-awaited widening of Irving Blvd from Keyenta Place to Universe Blvd and the widening of Universe from Irving to the entrance of CNM at McMahon Blvd is finally complete.

New playground equipment coming to Salida del Sol park. Councilor Lewis has committed \$97K of set-aside funds to replace the worn playground structure at this North 7 Bar neighborhood, and to make other safety improvements. The new equipment should arrive in July and take about 3 weeks to complete.

Youth Volunteers Needed


