## Message From the President ...

Will there, or won't there, be a Home Depot and a Wal-Mart at Coors and I-40? Right now nobody knows. Regardless of whether you wanted those stores at the intersection or not, one thing is certain: Without the strong involvement and opposition of area neighborhood associations, organizations very much like this one, most likely the ground would be broken soon or already broken for construction of that development.

As I watched the I-40 development, I was pretty much certain that it would become a reality. A well established developer, an approved site plan, nothing but neighbors in opposition, how many times have we seen something like that and seen the inevitable results? Regardless of how the folks closest to the development, and so the most affect-

to go in. Well organized, strongly supported, and very vocal opposition from the neighborhood associations, however, got that project at the very least significantly delayed and significantly altered, and very possibly gone for good.

And we've had another good lesson on the West Side about the strength of organized neighborhoods. How many years were the folks at Los Ranchos able to delay the construction of the Montano Bridge? Yes, it was eventually built in spite of their opposition, but I'll guarantee it looks much differently (sound barriers, landscaping, architectural detail) and behaves much differently (are there larger bike lanes anywhere in the US? China, maybe, but not here!) and took much longer to complete (we're talking decades) than ever would have been the case had the Los Ranchos neighborhoods not organized effectively and fought for so long.

What's my point? That development and road improvements are bad? No, not at all. My point is that a visible, well supported neighborhood association is your best voice in the community for the needs of the community. During the coming months, we'll be driving to raise membership in the Taylor Ranch Neighborhood

Association. We'll be working through the area's churches, retail establishments,

streets to get people in so that on a day to day basis, and when a big issue comes along, you can be heard, and more importantly, that what you say will make a difference. 




