Message from the President...

My wife, who is a saint, by the way, is occasionally flummoxed by the way one thing reminds me of another with the two not having a relationship most people would recognize. Somebody talks about some news item or an event in their lives, like their brother getting married, and suddenly I'm discussing Pickett's Charge. "What in the world does Bill's brother getting married," my wife might ask, "have to do with Pickett's Change?" "Well," I might answer, "Pickett's Charge is one of those things which seemed like a good idea at the time, but which in retrospect was clearly a futile and costly effort in pursuit of an impossible goal. Much like marriage - -" And then I'm interrupted by a request to roll my sleeping bag out on the couch for the next few nights. Heavy sigh.

The reason I mention this is because two items cropped up in the local news during the past few weeks which, on the surface, might not seem related but I think are.

F² of, the City Council, I think it was the City Council anyway, voted down a ing Wage" bill which would have required companies locating in Albuquerque and receiving tax abatements to pay their workers a preset wage. Presumably, the wage would be sufficient to keep an employee, and perhaps a small family supported by that employee, above the poverty line. The rationale in support of the bill was in part that it doesn't make sense to offer tax subsidies to poverty perpetuating businesses.

Second, teachers at Rio Grande High School want the concessions they made over a year ago rescinded. You might remember that the new principal at Rio Grande was given powers over transfer of teachers and a committee was cre- If you have a couple of hours ated to come up with other reforms to address what I believe to be real problems of discipline and dropout at Rio Grande. Well, more than a year passed. The dropout rate at Rio Grande is over 11% per year, or about one out of three students dropping out before graduation by the time all the years are put of the nominating committee together. And the committee which was supposed to come up with ideas and programs to improve the school has never even met. Never. Not once. As far as I know, not even for a coffee and doughnuts get to meet you kind of thing.

So, the teachers, understandably, have said, "Look, we offered these concessions in the hope of getting constructive change. If there is going to be no constructive change, we want to take back our concessions." What do our leaders on the school board have to say about this situation? Have they demanded answers of the principal and the committee as to why nothing's been done? Have they implemented a plan to make sure something is done? Are they at upset that absolutely zilch has happened? Um, no.

School board member Aggie Lopez was asked her reaction. She said, and I think this is darned close to the quote in the paper if not exact, "Everything's fine at Rio Grande High School. There is only an image problem." An image problem! Maybe the answer, then, is to hire a public relations firm for the school to explain to the public why we shouldn't be distraught about dropout rates over 30%, never mind the discipline problems. 

While I initially supported the "Living Wage" bill, I changed my mind after reading about Rio Grande H.S. and Aggie Lopez's position on Rio Grande. After all, growth has to start somewhere, and Albuquerque has to sell business on Albuquerque's assets. Which, if our school board thinks that 1/3 dropout rates are merely an image difficulty, will continue to be a poorly educated workforce in l part most capable of low skill and mental labor. And what sort of company is going to locate here and hire that workforce for more than the barest minimum of wages?

Until the people who care about high quality education demand aggressive leadership on the part of our school board and others, we will continue to receive "go along and get along" passoffs of real problems. We will continue to have difficulty attracting high Albuquerque. industry to Albuquerque will continue to languish in real economic growth, and our children will continue after they graduate from high school or college, to move to Dallas or Denver or Phoenix to find their futures. So, at least for now, we'd better put off any thought of a "Living Wage" bill or we're likely to choke off even that small amount of business we're able to presently attract.

Is the relationship between the city council's failed bill and the teacher's concessions at Rio Grande H.S. at least a little bit more recognizable to you now? I hope so! If y like to discuss it with me some more, come by any late night during the next week or so. I'd love someone to talk to. . . I get awfully lonesome sleeping on the couch.
