

Paseo del Norte Extension Update

Recently, the Taylor Ranch Neighborhood Association was asked to join Paradise Hills Civic Association and Ventana Ranch Neighborhood Association in the fight over the Paseo del Norte extension. The TRNA board members voted to ask the court to allow neighborhood associations to join the City of Albuquerque (Mayor, City, City Council, and Department of Municipal Development) as Defendants-Intervenors in CASE NO. CV 2005 01379.

This case was filed by the SAGE Council, Sierra Club, SWOP, SNEEJ, and others seeking to stop the City of Albuquerque from construction on the westward expansion of Paseo del Norte from Golf Course.

The vote by TRNA board members authorized the payment of \$250 to the law firm of Patrick J. Rogers, Modrall, Sperling, Roehl, Harris, & Sisk, P.A. to become part of this legal action. TRNA will now be informed of all legal actions by SAGE et al in their attempts to stop the Paseo expansion. This will be an uphill battle, as SAGE et al is attempting to prevent the Neighborhood Associations from involvement in the case. We will keep everyone updated as information is available.

History Corner #8

West Side Story

Fred van Berkel, Historian, TRNA

Out the window, you see what the neighborhood association envisioned instead of a giant road: an arroyo, power lines, bike trails -a thin slice of open space through the acres of houses.

It's even more than that, though. It's a slice through time to the mid-'70s, when this was *all* open space, and the West Side of today was just a crazy idea.

Van Berkel remembers. In 1977, he and his wife, Ceil, bought a house in one of the first sections of Taylor Ranch. They sold that house and moved a few blocks away when he built them a new one. After a decade or so, they moved overseas.

Then, they came back to the old neighbourhood.

"It feels like a little town," Ceil van Berkel says.

It's easy to see the West Side as nothing but dust, bulldozers and overnight construction. Seen through the van Berkels' eyes, it's something different -a place shaped by the slow, hard work of a community; the results sometimes hidden by time.

Fred van Berkel can remember petitioning to get a streetlight at Montaño and Coors Boulevard. "Not a traffic light, a streetlight," he says.

He can show you the original developer's office near the corner of Taylor Ranch Road and Montaño. It's now the

West Side YMCA. He can show you the lot with the fabulous view at the corner of Dellyne Road and Valle Vista Drive that couldn't be given away in the '70s.

More than that, he can show you a community's victories. Here's the first park, Montaño West, a neighbourhood playground the Taylor Ranch Neighborhood Association pushed for and a board member designed.

Here's Mariposa Basin Park, first proposed as a commercial softball field. Now it's a place for the whole community - and home of the annual Easter egg hunt. Here's the library. Here are schools. Here's the community center that finally opened in October.

"People think Taylor Ranch is new, and they think 'A community center?' But it's been 25 years," van Berkel says.

Twenty-five years ago this week, the Taylor Ranch Neighborhood Association was incorporated. It will celebrate that anniversary June 4 with a community party at Mariposa Basin Park.


Through the years, it has been a "rational" association, van Berkel says, willing to compromise, not wedded to one issue. That might be how it survives its defeats -and there have been some of those, too.

The van Berkels live in Saddle Ridge. Behind their house sits the old West Side Equestrian Center. For three years, since the lease expired, the neighborhood fought to keep the fields from being becoming more houses. They lost.

But just on the other side of the center, there's an arroyo, power lines, bike trails -a slice of open space through acres of houses.

"Here, they were supposed to build that six-lane highway," van Berkel says.

Report from the West Side Coalition

The West Side Coalition of Neighborhoods met Wednesday, May 4th at 7 pm at the Taylor Ranch Community Center. The agenda included the City's Chief Financial Officer, Gail Reese, regarding the City's \$446 Million 2006 Budget and its impact on the West Side, the Mayor's offer for a West Side Transportation Forum, and the 311 Call Center and what that will mean for City residents.

Michelle Halstead from Twin Mountain Construction also gave a short presentation on the current status of the Coors/I-40 Construction and present color schemes. This information is available on the Internet at http://www.nmgrip.com/projects.asp? project=14912&linkid=15143.

Information about the TRNA June 4th celebration was distributed and mentioned to the attendees.

Two votes were taken. The votes approved 1) presenting special recognition to Lt. Edmund Perea on his retirement for long standing contributions and service to the West Side and 2) forming a Coalition Transportation Committee. Mary Ellen Ainsley volunteered for the Committee from TRNA. Other volunteers are welcome. Contact Walt Sala to volunteer (890-7035).

Members were urged to contact the Majoy to encourage him to sign Council Cadigan's bill to begin restriping Montaño into four lanes as soon as possible and to veto Councilor O''Malley's bill which required additional studies of the use of the lanes on the bridge.
